Reformation Sunday Oct. 28

A history of the Kirkin' O' the Tartans: On July 25, 1745, Prince Charles Edward Stewart, "Bonnie Prince Charlie" led the Highland Clans of Scotland in an unsuccessful attempt to dethrone George II of England and to restore the Scottish throne to the Royal House of Stewart. Following that defeat, The Act of Proscription was placed on the vanquished Scots. This banned the wearing of any sign of the Tartan, forbad the speaking of Gaelic, outlawed Scottish music, dancing, or the playing of the pipes. Consequently, during church services, the Scottish people began to hide pieces of tartan in their clothing and would "finger" the tartan for a secret blessing or *Kirkin'* thus rededicating themselves to God and their Scottish heritage during a particular point in the service by the minister. This proscription lasted almost 50 years.

During World War II, Dr. Peter Marshall (*A Man Called Peter*) revived this tradition. He had come to the U.S. from Scotland and became the pastor of the New York Ave. Presbyterian Church in Washington D.C. and served as Chaplain of the U.S. Senate
