Welcome! It is a blessing to have you in worship with us today. We warmly invite your participation in the worship, fellowship, and ministry of this congregation where everyone is welcome as God's child. From Pastor Rosemary:

The season of Lent is a time of prayer, fasting and self-examination in preparation for the celebration of the resurrection of the Lord at Easter. It is a period of 40 days — like the flood of Genesis, Moses' sojourn at Mount Sinai, Elijah's journey to Mount Horeb, Jonah's call to Ninevah to repent, and Jesus' time of testing in the wilderness. (The Sundays in Lent are not counted in this reckoning of the time between Ash Wednesday and Easter, as every Lord's Day is a celebration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ.)

In the early church, Lent was a time of preparation for the celebration of baptism at the Easter Vigil. In many communities of faith, it remains a time to reflect deeply on the theme of baptismal discipleship. How well are we living into our covenant with God through Jesus Christ? We miss the majesty of Easter Sunday if we miss the preparation offered during Lent.

In order to prepare each week of our Lenten journey, the scriptures and sermon title will be listed in the hopes that you will read them and listen to what Jesus might be saying to you. Next week's road map includes "Where is Your Emmaus?" Exod. 17: 1-7; Luke 24: 13-16; 28-29. May you experience a blessed Lenten season.

The Reverend Peggy McClure received her Master of Divinity degree from Columbia Theological Seminary in Atlanta; J.D. degree from Cumberland Law School at Samford University in Birmingham; and B.A degree in Political Science and M.A. degree in Secondary Education from the University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa.

Peggy's career has been three-fold as a minister, lawyer and teacher. She has served as pastor at First Presbyterian Church of Decatur, First Presbyterian Church of Trussville, and the Executive Director of Community Grief Support Service in Birmingham. Her legal career was mostly with U.S. Steel Corporation where she was the head of its Law Department. In addition, she taught in the public schools in Alabama, Washington state and the American High School in Heidelberg, Germany.

Peggy serves on the Huntsville Symphony Board and the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) Board, and a member of the Rotary Club of Huntsville. She is also a member of the Commission on Ministry (COM) of the North Alabama Presbytery. She moved to Huntsville in 2013 to be near her family including two grandchildren, Reid 9, and Sloane 8. Her son, Dr. Steven Werdehoff, is an Emergency Room Physician at Huntsville Hospital.

And the people stood by, watching; but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!" The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, and saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews."
