From the Interim Pastor:

With the observance of Memorial Day, the summer season is officially here. This year, Pentecost comes right along with it. We will be celebrating Pentecost Sunday on June 9 as we hear again the story of how the Holy Spirit molded a group of fearful, but praying, disciples into a small band of fervent believers who changed the world. The Holy Spirit continues to desire to do that same work in us, if we are open and willing.

We have been observing 40 Days of Prayer here at St. Andrew in preparation for Pentecost. We have all been invited to pray specifically for the work of the Pastor Nominating Committee as that group of faithful, praying people continues to discern who God is calling to be the next pastor. Moses prayed about who to select as elders to help him serve God's people; Jesus prayed before he called the twelve disciples; Paul prayed about where to go to share the Good News and about whom he should take with him. What we see in the early church described in the Book of Acts is a praying and prayerful community where miracles happened.

Our Brief Statement of Faith describes just what this part of the Trinity, the very breath of God, does:

We trust in God the Holy Spirit,
everywhere the giver and renewer of life.
The Spirit justifies us by grace through faith,
sets us free to accept ourselves and to love God and neighbor,
and binds us together with all believers
in the one body of Christ, the Church.
The same Spirit

who inspired the prophets and apostles rules our faith and life in Christ through Scripture, engages us through the Word proclaimed, claims us in the waters of baptism, feeds us with the bread of life and the cup of salvation, and calls women and men to all ministries of the church.

In a broken and fearful world
the Spirit gives us courage
to pray without ceasing,
to witness among all peoples to Christ as Lord and Savior,
to unmask idolatries in Church and culture,
to hear the voices of peoples long silenced,

and to work with others for justice, freedom, and peace.

In asking the Spirit to blow here and in our own lives, what is the one specific prayer that you have for St. Andrew? Where is the one area in your life, or the life of someone you love, in which you would like to see the Holy Spirit move? You are invited to bring that prayer request, or requests, to church on June 2 and write it down on a strip of paper. The strips will be put together to form a chain that will hang in the sanctuary and be a visual reminder of what we are lifting up in prayer.
