From the Interim Pastor:



James 5:14: "Is anyone among you sick? Let them call the elders of the church to pray over them and anoint them with oil in the name of the Lord."

Recently, the Worship Team and the Member Care Team chairs met with me over concern for the number of people in this congregation who are ill, who are caring for someone who is ill, or who have other challenges and prayer needs,

and how we might better minister to them. After discussing various options, we felt the Spirit was leading us to offer a personal time of "Prayer for Wholeness" after worship on the first Sunday of each month. We will begin this offering September 1 in one of the classrooms or the parlor.

Who would this service be for? For members who are ill and would like prayer. For members who have a loved one who is ill and would like to receive prayer for that person. For members who are struggling with emotional or spiritual issues. For anyone in need of any kind of personal prayer.

What would happen during this time? The service would consist of a brief scripture, a time of prayer, anointing with oil, and laying on of hands for those who desire it. Leaders would include the pastor and at least one other elder (or commissioned member) trained in praying for specific needs in the areas of healing and wholeness.

Why would the church offer this? Because of the scripture mentioned above. Because it's what Jesus did, and we are called to model Jesus. Because our Book of Order states: "Services of wholeness and healing are one way of enacting the church's ministry of pastoral care. The central element in these services is prayer, calling upon God's saving grace or giving thanks for healing received. It includes the proclamation of the Word, focusing on the promise of abundant life in Jesus Christ. Prayers may be enacted through the laying on of hands and anointing with oil, remembering that healing always comes as a gift from God, not as a product of human prayer." In other words, our prayers are lifted to God who heals as God sees fit.

I will be explaining more about this service in the weekly announcements and the bulletin over the month August. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me.

Pastoral Nominating Committee (PNC) Progress Report July 24, 2019

Summary

St. Andrew's PNC continues to work on your behalf to find our next pastor. To date, we have evaluated 163 PIF's (Personal Information Forms). Numerous candidates were of interest to the PNC, all of whom indicated they would consider a ministry in Alabama. Of all the candidates we contacted, only a small handful would actually consider relocating to Alabama.

The latest candidate considered was interviewed by phone, and a site visit was planned. Unfortunately, the candidate fell seriously ill and had to cancel the visit and withdraw from consideration.

Recently, Rev. Kim Mitchel met with the PNC to consult with us and provide advice on our approach. She worked with us on two tasks. She reviewed our interview questions and provided input as to changes. She also recommended that we revise our MIF (Ministry Information Form) to hopefully help potential candidates better understand our ministry.

The interview questions were revised and used in our latest candidate interview. The MIF has been revised based on Rev. Mitchel's suggestions. In addition to Rev. Mitchel's suggestions, we updated the Clerk of Session information and changed the position to full time Solo Pastor

We have uploaded the revised MIF to the CLC (Church Leadership Connection) and requested and received a new group of PIF's. We are reviewing these candidates now. We have invited Tom Lewis, our COM (Committee on Ministry) liaison, and Christie Ashton, our Presbytery's stated clerk, to meet with us and provide any advice or insight they may have to offer. They have agreed to meet, but based on their and PNC members' vacation and travel schedules, it looks like it will be September before we can get together.

We continue to covet prayers from each of you to ask God to guide our efforts as well as to put St. Andrew's ministry on the heart of the next pastor He has chosen to lead our church. Thank you again for your continued support.

St. Andrew Stated Session Meeting Notes of July 17, 2019

- St. Andrew membership at 74 following dismissal of Daniel Marsh from the church roll.
- ♦ The mortgage is still projected to be paid off about October 2019; current balance after June payment is approximately \$17,100.
- Approved the initiation of "Prayer for Wholeness" opportunity in which an informal prayer gathering will be conducted on the first Sunday of the month following the worship service to offer a personal time for prayer with the pastor and an elder (or commissioned member) for those who may be facing illnesses or other issues. These gatherings could consist of a time of prayer, brief scripture, anointing of oil, and laying on of hands for those who desire it. More information concerning this initiative will be forthcoming.
- ♦ In the called Session Meeting of June 26, the session approved a Threat Action Plan to address actions to be taken during a threatening event at church. To that end, Rev. McMahan has been seeking out individuals to volunteer serving on the Action Team who will receive training from Lt. Ward of the Decatur Police Department and W.C. Sweeley. Installation of security cameras continues along with the updating of the church's first aid kit and the investigation on the use and procurement of a defibrillator on-site.
- The Christian Education Committee reported on the various youth attending Maranatha and Montreat this summer, a review of this year's VBS, and presented a proposed Wednesday night schedule for this upcoming school year. It was noted that a CEC meeting will be held on July 31 to make a final decision on the schedule and what activities will be offered on Wednesday night.
- The Nominating Committee reported that a slate of three prospective candidates for elders have been nominated and that the search continues for two members for the Nominating Committee to replace two members rotating off. A congregational meeting is tentatively set for Oct. 20 to vote on these nominations and to receive nominations from the floor, if any.
- A draft of the proposed Church Bylaws was presented to Session for further review and solicitation of changes with the expectation that a final draft will be presented at the next stated session meeting for approval.
- An update of the PNC was received.
- Next stated meeting will be held Wednesday, September 18, at 4:30 PM.
