### A Message from Pastor Tripp Brogdon:

A few months ago I went down a rabbit hole of old Dr. Seuss books. They were books that I read over and over again as a child. The illustrations were so distinctive, of course, but his way with words, his rhymes, and his humor always stood out to me. The fantasy worlds that he created seemed, at first glance, so far-fetched and so far away from the reality of human life. But the messages and quotes that came from those fantasy worlds often hit so close to home.

From *Horton Hears a Who*: "A person's a person, no matter how small." Contrary to popular belief, there was a time when I was small, and when I was small, these words gave me a feeling of acceptance and worth in a large world.

From *The Lorax*: "Unless someone like you cares a whole awful lot, nothing is going to get better. It's not." Challenging, but true words for kids and adults alike.

From *Oh, the Places You'll Go*: "You're off to Great Places! Today is your day! Your mountain is waiting, so... get on your way!" A classic encouragement and motivator for every high school graduate taking the next step in their life.

And then comes my absolute favorite, from *Happy Birthday to You!*: "Today you are you, that is truer than true. There is no one alive who is you-er than you. Shout aloud, I am glad to be what I am. Thank goodness I'm not a ham, or a clam, or a dusty old jar of gooseberry jam. I am what I am, what a great thing to be."

In light of this last quote, I do worry sometimes about how we Christians approach the season of Lent. As we so often say, Lent is a time for confessing our sin and failures, repenting, and trying to change our ways.

If we are not careful, though, our heightened awareness and emphasis on our sin during this season can cause us to disagree with Dr. Seuss. After self-reflection and confession, we may not think it's a great thing to be us, that our sin and brokenness can make us sad (instead of glad) to be who we are.

Hear this good news: our poor decisions, wrong actions, failures, and sins do not take away our value as human beings, created by God in the image of God. Our value has nothing to do with us. Instead, our value has everything to do with Jesus Christ, who loves us and saves us.

Even as we travel with him to the cross and speak of repentance during Lent, know that through it all, you are who you are: a beloved child of God. What a great thing to be.

Nothing, not even your sin, can change that.

#### **Christian Education News**

St. Andrew has three adult Sunday school classes that meet at 8:45 a.m. Classes have multiple teachers that rotate teaching responsibilities. Topics range from Bible study and theology to Christian living and contemporary issues. The Hargrave class meets in room 122; the Hoppers class meets in the library; and the Seekers class meets in the senior high room. If you are looking for opportunities to grow closer to God and your friends at St. Andrew, visit one or all of our Sunday school classes.

After the Christian Education committee met recently for a work day, we were able to take a car load of old curriculum to Love Packages ministry, which ships collected literature around the world to help spread the Gospel. Near the end of 2022, Love Packages had shipped out 1726 tons for the year. Opportunities are available for volunteers at the local warehouse in Trinity if you are interested.

In the coming weeks, the committee will be working to catalog all of the adult curriculum that was collected from individual classrooms. After this work is completed, teachers will be able to find excellent curriculum here in our church library. Just let us know if you want to use something before it is cataloged.

## It's time to order flowers for Easter which is Sunday, April 9.


You may donate in memory or in honor of someone. A sign-up sheet is in the church office with an envelope for your donations. <u>Deadline is Sunday, April 2.</u>
