#### A Message from Pastor Tripp Brogdon:

Lately I've been having some fun experimenting with one of the new Artificial Intelligence software programs named ChatGPT. The technology is fascinating, exciting, and in some ways, scary.

I wonder how many of us, like ChatGPT, can say the right words when asked. I would venture to guess that the overwhelming majority of St. Andrew could do what this software did. We can say the words just fine. Why is that, though? Is it just because we've been taught what to say? Is it because we think that's what we're supposed to say? Or is it because we have experienced the risen Lord Jesus Christ ourselves? Throughout the rest of this blessed Easter Season, may we not lose sight of that important distinction, and may our words not be hollow.
