As most of you know, my wonderful grandmother "B" died in August. She was two months shy of her 101st birthday. She enjoyed a full century of living, loving, and leaving her mark on this world.

And you know what? Even when you know it's coming... even when someone has lived a beautifully long life, grief still finds a way to

knock the wind out of you. I'm not alone in that feeling; we've all been there.

I'm not going to pretend that I have handled it all with grace and composure. There were tears, there are <u>still</u> tears, there have been moments of sitting on the couch staring at nothing, and there have been nights when sleep felt impossible.

But in the midst of my grief, something miraculous happened: my community... you... showed up for me.

It wasn't in some grand, orchestrated way. There wasn't fanfare or loud announcements. You just steadily showed up, the way that St. Andrew has always shown up.

Someone brought a meal. Someone else sent a text that simply said, "Praying for you today." A card arrived in the mail, a phone call came, and a hug was offered after worship. These are small things... ordinary things... things that might seem insignificant if you weren't the one receiving them.

But when you're grieving, those small things become big things... extraordinary things... things that mean the world to the one receiving them. Sometimes the best thing we can do is to just show up, with the ministry of our presence.

My grandmother lived through a century of changes. She saw technology transform the world, she witnessed wars and peace, and she experienced loss and celebration. But what she talked about the most was the Triune God who loved her, her family who loved her, and her church family that always showed up.

Community isn't complicated, even when grief is present. It's a casserole when words fail. It's a text message at just the right moment. It's the knowledge that you don't have to walk through the hard stuff alone.

When we show up for each other... in the big moments and the small ones... we reflect the very heart of God.

So thank you. Thank you for being the kind of church that shows up.

MEET THE CHOIR

I was born in Atlanta, Georgia, then my family moved to Decatur when I was 6 months old. I have always considered Decatur to be my home even though we moved around between Kansas, Alabama, and Georgia starting in the second grade. We moved back to Decatur for my senior year in high school and I graduated from Decatur High.

Many of you know my siblings- Ceil Hydrick is a member of St. Andrew, Cynthia Younger participated in the formation of Grace Presbyterian in Madison and now lives in Washington State, and last, but not least, Tom Lewis, who is currently pastor of Copeland Presbyterian in Limestone County. I am 3rd in line . I graduated from the University of Georgia in 1982, taught in Georgia for a year, then moved back to Decatur where I met my husband of 40 years, Roger, in June 1984. We married June 8,1985 at First Presbyterian Church in Decatur. Our first daughter, Beth, was born in January 1987 and our second daughter, Melissa, in August 1990. During this time, Roger and I were members of Covenant Presbyterian and Roger and both girls were baptized there. Both of our daughters are married. I recently retired after 43 years as a Special Educator where I taught children from ages 3-21 with mild to severe developmental disabilities including Autism. In addition to my B.S. in Education from UGA, I have additional certification from the University of Alabama, and Master's and Educational Specialist degrees from the University of Alabama in Birmingham. I worked for Clarke County (GA) schools, Decatur City Schools, Madison City Schools, Fayetteville City Schools (TN), and Giles County Schools (TN) serving in teaching and administrative positions until I finally retired in June. I have also done private contract work, evaluation, and tutoring for North Alabama Schools and worked as an adjunct instructor for Athens State University where I taught part-time and supervised student teachers.

Music has always been an important part of my life. Our parents loved music. My mother readily admitted that she could not carry a tune, and she always said she did not know where she got children that could sing. She always wanted to sing so she made sure we all took piano lessons and supported our participation in church and school choirs. The piano lessons did not stick, but we did learn to read and appreciate music. I have sung in church choirs from the time I was a little girl and then in the adult choir off and on since high school. During high school I also started assisting with children's choir and sang in the school chorus. While attending the University of Georgia I sang in the Women's Glee Club for 3 years and played guitar at the Presbyterian Student Center. As an adult I especially enjoyed serving as music staff for Cursillo weekends where I played guitar and sang with other musicians. I love to make a joyful noise!

Over the years I have been active in a variety of church activities in addition to singing in the choir including teaching Sunday School and Vacation Bible School, leading Youth Group, directing children's choir and programs, serving as a Stephen Minister, serving as Moderator of Tennessee Valley Presbyterian Cursillo and serving as a moderator of Copeland Presbyterian's Presbyterian Women as well as an Elder and Copeland's Clerk of Session. I continue to serve at the North Alabama Presbytery level as Historian of Presbyterian Women.



Your safety team has a plan and protocol in place should an event occur, which includes locking down the sanctuary and contacting law enforcement. Many of the folks sitting in the pews with you have volunteered to help in this effort, and have been faithful in their duties to learn and train.

The following items are highlights of the September 24, 2025, Stated Session Meeting:

- 1. The September Stated Session Meeting was held on Wed., September 24, 2025, at 2:00 p.m.
- 2. The meeting was opened with a devotional led by Shelly Shull on Matthew 25:6.
- 3. John Jordan was elected to be our commissioner to the Fall Meeting of North Alabama Presbytery which will be held at Camp Maranatha on October 21, 2025.
- 4. The minutes of the Stated Session Meeting of July 16, 2025, were approved as amended and the minutes of the Called Session Meeting on August 10, 2025, were approved as issued.
- 5. August year to date income was \$2,365 less than budgeted and expenses were \$19,794 less than budgeted. Our checking and saving accounts increased by \$42,364 since the first of the year.
- 6. Building and grounds team cut down and removed 3 trees, installed a new lockable mailbox, and new LED lights are being considered for the kitchen.
- 7. B. J. Breeding reminded us that on October 8 we will have our annual cookout and on November 12, 2025, Tripp will be leading a Bible study.
- 8. Jackie Naumann reminded us that the CATS trip to the Old Cookstove is Friday, and our church picnic will, be on October 8, 2025. Christmas brunch will be on Sunday, December 21, 2025.
- 9. Barb Mouton and John Jordan updated us on mission work. We provided over 300 packs of paper and spiral bound notebooks for the Decatur City School and Decatur Youth Services school supply drive,. We plan to give our 25% of the Peace and Global Witness offering to NCC's Nehemiah Home for single mothers and their children. We plan to pack our Thanksgiving dinners after worship on Sunday, November 23, 2025. On Sunday, September 28, 2025, Barb will do a "Minute for Mission" on St. Andrew's metal recycling program which benefits Habitat for Humanity of Morgan County, and will be handing out bags for home collection to worshipers that Sunday.
- 10. As we continue to be blessed as a church, the Session, acting on a recommendation from the Mission Team, voted to give \$20,000 to the Morgan County Child Advocacy Center for new equipment for their facility to better serve youth and help them avoid having to send Decatur youth to Huntsville for services that they have previously been unable to provide in Decatur.
- 11. Linda Grissom informed us that World Communion Sunday will be celebrated on October 5, 2025, and that Rev. Laura Lemley will lead us in worship on October 12, 2025, when Rev. Brogdon will be taking his remaining study leave for the year.
- 12. Nellie Gates discussed her ongoing work to update church policies. So far, she has met with the Education and Member Care teams.
- 13. Rev. Brogdon led us in another installment of the Session Visioning and Discernment process. This time we reviewed a survey which highlighted what is important to young adult parents regarding beliefs, actions, and the role of the church when it comes to raising children in these trying times.
- 14. The next Stated meeting will be on Wednesday, November 19, 2025, at 2:00 pm.


